# Make connections

1.

Connect remotely with colleagues across school districts, grade levels or content areas to brainstorm ideas and collaborate.

2.

Have students collaborate to conduct and record how-to-demonstrations before class.

3.

Facilitate peer learning to accelerate students' foreign language skills. Students in a foreign language class can virtually visit a school in another country or region and chat in small groups.



# Meet the needs of all learners

Using camera technology might sound counter intuitive, but 42% of teachers reported that students in the classroom have trouble seeing images and other material from the other side of the classroom.<sup>1</sup> With Logitech Meetup, educators can bring content closer to students and provide a more personalized learning experience, giving every student a front-row seat.

1.

Record lessons so students can rewatch at a later date, perhaps in preparation for end of semester final exams or tests.

2.

3.

Meet students where they are. Host small work or study sessions with students in-person or remotely to provide more tailored instruction and assessment for project-based learning.
